









Arizona K-12 Landscape

- Enrollment: 1 million public school students attend ~3000 district/charter schools
- Type of Schooling: 72% district schools, 20% charter schools, 8% private and homeschool
- Districts: 224 school districts, all with locally elected, nonpartisan school boards
- Budget: State budgets ~\$6,500 basic aid per student, local taxpayers foot \$4000 more (50th in US/DC)




- AZ first passed a tax credit scholarship in 1998
- Tax credits are processed by School Tuition
 Organizations (STOs), which take a 10% fee
- Taxpayers receive dollar-for-dollar tax credits for their donations
- Students can "stack" scholarships to pay for private school tuition and fees — no transparency as to how much students receive

Impacts of STO Vouchers

- Total Cost: \$2.6 billion over the past 25 years
- Cost Growth: \$64 million program when first passed — will topple \$300 million this year
- Original 1998 program was expanded 3 times (Low Income Corporate 2007, Disabled/Displaced 2009, Switcher 2013)
- Nearly half of STO funding is now corporate tax credits






- Public, taxpayer dollars used for private school, microschool & homeschool expenses — anything loosely deemed "educational"
- The law implemented zero accountability, zero transparency, zero safety measures
- Vouchers are wide open for fraud & abuse



- Estimated vs. actual cost
 1st year: \$33M vs. \$550M
- Estimated vs. projected cost
 2nd year: \$65M vs. \$950M
- Voucher spending is projected to cost \$200 300M over budget this year








- Arizona is facing a \$400M budget shortfall due to flat tax enactment and universal vouchers
- Over \$400M in new dollars being drained by universal vouchers
- Cannot afford to prop up a new school system at a time when budgets are being squeezed
- Vouchers are breaking the budget






AZ's ESA Voucher Grift

AZ's Vouchers Lack Accountability

- Zero requirements for accreditation or state approvals
- Zero curriculum standards
- Zero requirements for certified teachers
- Zero background checks or safety standards
- Zero requirements for academic accountability
- Zero requirements for hours/days of school
- Zero graduation requirements





- Per-pupil funding is 49th in the US
- AZ's per-capita budget is 48th in the US and shrinking
- 2nd most crowded class sizes in the US
- AZ's teacher salaries rank in the bottom 5 across the US
- Teacher retention crisis is growing daily
- Student-to-counselor ratio is 2nd worst in US
- School facilities are \$3B in arrears since 2000





- Hurts rural & low-income families who rely on public schools
- 50% of ESA funding going to 10% of districts (suburban, well off)
- Doesn't help the students it was intended to help, including special needs students
- No accountability
- Creates a two-tiered system of haves and have-nots





Consequences of Vouchers

- Grift: strip mall private schools, unaccredited microschools, voucher processing companies, fly-by-night operators, voucher middlemen
- Charters converting to private schools: less transparency and accountability
- Price increases: Private schools raising tuition, pricing out low-income families
- Dramatic public school impacts: Public school closures, teacher layoffs, 4-day school weeks, teacher/staff reduction,



Deciding Voucher Vote in Arizona
