

2015 IDAHO HIGH SCHOOL CAREER & COLLEGE READINESS SCORES

Dear Idahoans,

How many Idaho high school students graduate every year adequately prepared for a career and/or college in today's economy? Idaho Business for Education (IBE) found the answer in the State Department of Education's report on SAT scores. This report breaks out the data, so that community and business leaders can better understand where we stand today, and the gap that must be addressed.

The answer statewide is 20 percent.

You will find the specific results for your local schools in the accompanying report.

Twenty percent of Idaho students who took the SAT last spring scored at a level that the State Board of Education considers "College and Career Ready." Scoring below this level indicates that the student will likely need costly and time-consuming remediation when he or she enrolls in postsecondary schools after high school. Not only is this costly, but research indicates that students who need remediation are much more likely to drop out prior to completing college or postsecondary work. In fact, today Idaho has the highest postsecondary dropout rate in the U.S.

How many of our students need to go on to postsecondary education after high school? That is a critical question. Numerous research studies, including one conducted by the IBE here in Idaho, clearly indicate that 60 percent of the jobs of the future will require some type of postsecondary education (defined as one, two, four or more years with a diploma or certificate). It follows that at least 60 percent of our high school students should be prepared to succeed at the postsecondary level. Today, in Idaho, only one public high school is exceeding the 60 percent goal—the Coeur D'Alene Charter Academy.

The 60 percent goal is relatively new. For a long time, schools have focused simply on graduation rates; i.e., how many students complete high school, rather than how well-prepared high school graduates are for postsecondary education. It is understandable that the gap is large, because this has not been an area of focus for our schools. Therefore, the goal is high, and the gap is large.

All research shows that if we focus on this issue, we can make great progress—by working together to understand the importance of postsecondary education and better preparing our students. In the last few years, thanks to our governor and our legislature, and guided by the Governor's Taskforce Road Map, we have made inroads into the policy changes needed to support the state's 60 percent goal. It will now take a laserlike focus from the local school districts to improve SAT scores and prepare students for the rigors of a postsecondary education.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Where does the data in this report come from?

The Idaho State Board of Education provides this data. For the last several years, Idaho has been paying for every high schooler in the state to take the SAT. The test is typically taken in the spring of a student's 11th-grade year. The intent is to get a good indicator of our students' readiness for postsecondary schooling.

Why does Idaho have a 60 percent goal?

Studies show that at least 60 percent of Idaho's future workers need a postsecondary credential—either a workforce-ready certificate, an associate degree, a bachelor's or advanced degree.

What is the Scholastic Assessment Test (SAT)?

SAT is a standardized test first adopted in 1926, which tests students on three components: writing, reading and mathematics.

Why is the SAT important?

All high school juniors in Idaho are expected to take the SAT. The SAT is considered one of the best ways to determine whether students are prepared for college-level work.

When is a student considered "College and Career Ready"?

The State Board of Education considers a student college ready when he or she scores 500 or greater on each of the three components of the SAT—writing, reading and mathematics. At that point, it is nearly assured the student will not need remediation at the postsecondary level.

How many of Idaho's high school juniors scored 500 or greater on all three components of the SAT?

In 2015, 20 percent of the juniors who took the SAT were college ready.

What do these scores mean?

The goal of preparing students for success at the postsecondary level is a relatively new focus for our high schools. Traditionally, the primary emphasis has been on high school graduation rates. The future of our state requires we shift our focus to student achievement and to preparing students for success at the postsecondary level. IBE feels the correct interpretation of this data is clear—it is a baseline of where we are today. The goal is clear—60 percent. It will take focus and community support to move our scores toward that goal. The future will not wait, so we would like this gap to be attacked with the sense of urgency it demands.

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
